


AVERAGE NUMBER OF AREAS REACHED PER YEAR



2.2. Social Employment Fund Programme

Thembalethu Development was one of the first organisations that partnered with the Industrial Development Corporation (IDC) to implement the initial phase of the Social Employment Fund Programme also known as SEF. In 2023, the organisation continued to implement SEF programme until its end in July 2023. During this period, the programme was implemented in both the Western Cape and the Eastern Cape provinces.

After the success of SEF phase 1, the organization was again appointed to continue with the implementation of the phase 2 of the programme from August 2023 until May 2024. In this period the organisation expanded its footprint to Gauteng and the two areas of Tembisa and Alexander were selected. By December 2023, 3,676 work opportunities have been created.

Participants employed to work in the programmes are involved in various work for common good activities for 8 days or 64 hours per month. The work for common good is derived from various themes such as Education Support, Food Security and Nutrition, Greening and Environment, Waste Management, Community Health and Care Support. During SEF phase 2, the IDC introduced another exciting theme called the Micro-enterprise. This is the theme that enables some participants to be place in various small local businesses and learns various skills that will enable them to gain skills and use the skills to generate their additional income and eventually start their own small micro-enterprises. 200 participants were place under this theme and are placed at various small businesses in both the Western Cape and Gauteng. The new theme is proving to be a success as some of these participants have already started generating additional income by providing various services to communities on their own outside the SEF Programme



a) Programme Impacts

The work opportunities created to 3,676 unemployed people who received monthly stipends from the programme brings immediate relief to participants as they have a source of income. Over 44 000 community members are also indirectly benefiting through various programme activities.

1. SECTOR: EDUCATION SUPPORT

Output

- 141 schools supported in both Western Cape, Eastern Cape and Gauteng.
- 105,680 learners benefited at schools through activities that participants perform to support education.
- 447 Teacher assistants are placed at schools.
- 309 participants placed at food gardens at schools to establish and maintain food gardens that support the school feeding schemes.
- 307 reading clubs were established to improve the reading skills amongst learners.
- 3,373 learners benefited and and improved reading skills through reading clubs.

ACTIVITIES

Educational support consists of a variety of activities at schools and Early Childhood Development (ECD) centres. Thembalethu Development supports programmes that aim at promoting a strong community culture of learning and support for learners at risk of dropping out of school. These activities include:

- Scholar patrols (Walking bus) participants walk children from their homes to the school in the mornings and back in the afternoon in areas that are known for violence. They are ensuring that children get to school safe and on time and prevent bullying amongst learners and any other form of violence.
- Reading Clubs participants facilitate reading sessions with learners at school and in the after school space to ensure learners read for meaning, fun and improve their literacy level.
- Sports coaching participants coach and mentor learners in the after school space to ensure they excel in sports and using sports as a development tool to teach life skills.
- **Teacher/School assistants** supporting teachers and schools with administrative and learning processes.
- Food gardens and feeding schemes providing much needed labour to food gardens that ultimately support the feeding schemes that provide daily meals to children that in some extreme cases is their the only meal for the day.

2. SECTOR: FOOD SECURITY & NUTRITION

Output

- 739 participants engaged in vegetable production.
- 60 school gardens were established at various schools
- 41,000 children benefited from food gardens produce.
- Equivalent to 14 hectares of land being maintained at school and community gardens.
- 9 other community food gardens were established.
- An amount of R67,000 was generated from community gardens



ACTIVITIES

The SEF programme have been providing poor households access to affordable vegetables by establishing food gardens and providing nutritional meals at the community feeding schemes. The aim is to produce fresh vegetables and herbs for our struggling soup kitchens, ECD centers, schools, and homes for vulnerable members of society.







3. SECTOR: COMMUNITY HEALTH AND CARE SUPPORT

Output

- 151 SEF participants place within this sector.
- 3,354 home visits were conducted monthly.
- An average of 75 beneficiaries supported with mental health care support monthly.
- 38 nurse assistants and carers placed at facilities.
- 30 community health care facilities supported.
- An overage of 198 patients were traced for purposes of taking medication monthly.
- A monthly average of 124 beneficiaries afflicted with a communicable disease received services.

ACTIVITIES

- The Community Health and Care support programme aim to strengthen our healthcare sector, caring for the vulnerable and elderly in our communities.
- The health and community care programme offer comprehensive services that grant communities direct and immediate access to essential primary care.
- By educating communities on what resources are available and giving them the tools to access care, home base care workers empower people to take control of their own health and how to overcome barriers to living healthier lives.
- The programme aims to assist parents in understanding their children better and this can help prevent children from taking part in harmful activities.







4. SECTOR: GREENING AND ENVIRONEMENT-

WASTE MANAGEMENT

Output

- 151 tons of waste were collected.
- 46 tons of waste was recycled.
- R48,800 was generated from the sales of recycled materials.

ACTIVITIES

Our activities around Environment and Greening theme are on waste management. Thembalethu Development has been assisting local community members and Community Based Organisations (CBOs) in both the Western Cape and Gauteng who are engaging on Waste Management to improve their waste management and recycling activities.







5. SECTOR: MICRO-ENTERPRISE

Output

- 145 participants were placed in various businesses and were mentored and supported.
- 78 participants had already started generating additional income.
- R174,445 has already been generated.

ACTIVITIES

- In August 2023, the new theme of Micro-Enterprise was introduced with in the programme.
- TD was fortunate to have been selected as one of the organisations to pilot the theme.
- The purpose of this theme is to establish small local entrepreneurs.
- Participants were placed into small local businesses to learn and upskill their various skills and translate their newly acquired skill into income generation.
- The participants are placed and trained in various filled such as:
 - Waste Management
 - Welding
 - Sewing
 - Plumbing
 - Spray painting /Panel beating
 - Barber
 - Brickmaking
 - Upholstery/Carpentry
 - Basic Electric
 - Business Management









2.3. Community Work Programme

During the first quarter of the year, the organisation continued to implement one of the biggest poverty alleviation programmes which is the Community Work Programme and commonly known as the CWP. Its purpose is to provide an employment safety net and create access to a minimum level of regular and predictable work opportunities for those who need it, targeting areas of high unemployment, where sustainable alternatives are likely to remain limited for the foreseeable future. The organisation was responsible for the implementation of the programme in the Northern Cape and the Western Cape. During this period, 42,549 work opportunities were created between the two provinces.

Beneficiaries or participants that are recruited and employed in the programme are also required to engage in various useful and meaningful work activities that makes an impact within their communities for 02 days/week or 8 days/64 hours per month. The structure of the programme is structured in a way that allows participants to use extra days for their own activities and develop themselves. Participants are then paid their monthly stipend based on the number of days they have worked. These useful work activities are derived from various sectors, such as agriculture, community services, construction, education, health and social services.



a) Programme Impacts

Concluded in March 2023, the organisation's implementation of the Community Work Programme (CWP) in the Northern Cape and Western Cape created 42,549 work opportunities, providing an employment safety net and fostering community development through meaningful engagement in various sectors.

Additionally, participants undertook renovations to improve infrastructure such as schools, clinics, and community halls, ensuring these essential facilities meet the needs of the community.


Thembalethu Development is actively involved in waste management and cleaning initiatives, collecting bottles, plastic, cardboard, and paper. Participants conducted clean-ups of public spaces, rivers, and canals, as well as clearing bush and overgrown areas while engaging in soil rehabilitation efforts.



SECTOR: HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES

Activities

Thembalethu Development offers assistance at orphanages, old age homes, and hospices, including home-based care visits and meal distribution to those in need. Participants also provide security at schools and pension pay points, as well as facilitate referrals to government facilities for additional assistance.





2.4. Extended Public Works Programme (EPWP)

Between January and March 2023, the organisation continued to implement the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP)- Non-State Sector programme which was in partnership with the Independent Development Trust (IDT). The programme was implemented in Limpopo, Gauteng and the Northern Cape.

This is the programme which aimed at providing short-term employment opportunities to unemployed people by creating meaningful work opportunities that promote self-reliance among participants and a developmental agenda within communities. The participants in the programme engaged in activities that improve the outlook of their communities.

ACTIVITIES

- Community waste management by cleaning of parks, local towns, and landscapes, and eradication of litter in public spaces.
- Assist in light infrastructure work such as patching up potholes and unblocking storm-water drainage on access roads.
- Assisting schools and Early Childhood Development Centers by establishing and maintaining of food gardens and cleaning.



a) Programme Impacts

The organisation achieved and exceeded the allocated targets which means that more people were able to get work opportunities. The over achievement is due to other people leaving the programmes due to better job opportunities an making spaces for others.

Skills Development Programme

General Education and Training Certificate: Adult Basic Education and Training

Thembalethu Development appointed by the Services SETA to offer the General Education and Training Certificate: Adult Basic Education Training (GETC:ABET) Learning Programme to 400 beneficiaries in Limpopo, Mpumalanga, North West, Northern Cape and the Western Cape. The training programme was intended for low-skilled employees from the Community Works Programme (CWP) who require some communication skills to perform their jobs productively, accurately, efficiently and safely. The intended beneficiaries were equipped with verbal and written communication skills to enable them to perform functions that involve basic mathematics, such as counting money, taking measurements, and inventorying stock. This is through the (5) selected units standards that learners were taken through which equals to 25 credits as shown below.

ACTIVITIES

- · Adult Basic Education Training (ABET) to 400 beneficiaries across multiple provinces.
- The training was aimed at low-skilled employees from the Community Works Programme (CWP), focusing on enhancing their communication skills for productive, accurate, efficient, and safe job performance.
- Beneficiaries are equipped with verbal and written communication skills, as well as basic mathematics abilities necessary for tasks such as money handling, measurements, and stock inventorying.



2.6 | UNEMPLOYED YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

SKILLS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Thembalethu Development was appointed by the Mining Qualification Authority (MQA) to implement the Unemployed Youth Development Programme in the Elias Motsoaledi Local Municipality of the Sekhukhune District, Limpopo Province. The organisation had to achieve this by providing accredited training to 80 unemployed youth in order to improve their competency and skills so they can become employable, start their own small farming enterprises and some pursue careers in agriculture. The district is one of the five districts of the Limpopo with the highest unemployment rate and has a dire need for skills development, particularly youth.

From the 80 learners allocated, 34 were the learners that had already complete the skills programme in the previous round and were enrolled to complete the remaining units standards and completed the full NQF level 3 Full qualification in Plant Production. The other 46 of the learners were new learners that were enrolled for NQF Level 3 Skills programme: Plant Production.

ACHIEVEMENTS

- Out of 80 learners, 79 were able to complete their respective qualifications with one learner drop out in the middle of the programme due to better work opportunity.
- Five cooperatives were formed and registered with the CIPC.
- As part of the exit strategy, each learner received a buying voucher of R500 which can only be redeemed for agricultural products.
- More stakeholders such as the Small Enterprise Development Agency, National Youth Development Agency and Nedbank were mobilized to provide various workshops such as funding opportunities for SMMEs, Business Management and Leadership, Funding for youth, Financial Literacy
- 13 of the leaners got employment from various farms around Elias Motsoaledi Local municipality.
- One of the registered cooperatives was allocated 2 hectares of land by the local traditional council to start their small-scale farming.



CONCLUSION

Thembalethu Development is proud to showcase the impactful socio-economic development programmes delivered in 2023. Over 46,000 work opportunities were created through initiatives like the Social Employment Fund (SEF) and the Community Work Programme (CWP). These programmes addressed poverty while fulfilling essential needs in education, waste management, and healthcare within communities. Skills development was another area of focus, with over 1,540 people benefited from our programmes. The Adult Basic Education and Training (ABET) programme provided essential communication and mathematics skills, and the Unemployed Youth Development Programme in Limpopo offered accredited training in Plant Production, empowering youth for future employment or agricultural entrepreneurship. These programmes positively impacted over 234,525 community members.

We are thankful for the partnerships that enabled us to deliver these impactful programmes across six provinces. The Industrial Development Corporation (IDC), Department of Cooperatives Governance and Traditional Affairs (CoGTA), Independent Development Trust (IDT), Mining Qualifications Authority (MQA), and Services SETA provided crucial financial support. It is worth noting that the Unemployed Youth Development Programme specifically addressed youth unemployment in Limpopo, equipping them with agricultural skills and fostering entrepreneurship through cooperative formation.
